FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Many times throughout the Gospels we are told not to worry and not to be afraid because God loves us and is always with us to guide and to help. While this is comforting it can be at the same time, a challenging message for us to live by in these trying times. In today's Gospel we are once again comforted and also challenged. It is comforting to remember that we are compared to sheep who have a loving shepherd who would lay down his life for his sheep. As this Gospel tells us, Jesus' love and care extends to other sheep, not of this fold. We are, therefore, encouraged by Jesus to extend our care, not only to our close neighbours, but also to all of the planet Earth: that is, the whole community of creation. This can, indeed, be a challenge. As we ponder our role to be good shepherds at this time in history, we know how difficult it can be, especially in light of the climate crisis we are now facing. However, Jesus promises us that he will be with us, helping us to walk in his footsteps, however, challenging that may be. We can therefore, be comforted while we work for justice, putting our trust in God and giving God thanks.

AKATHIST HYMN TO ST. JOSEPH:

O holy and righteous Joseph! While yet on earth, you did have boldness before the Son of God, Who was well pleased to call you His father, in that you were the betrothed of His Mother, and Who was well pleased to be obedient to you. 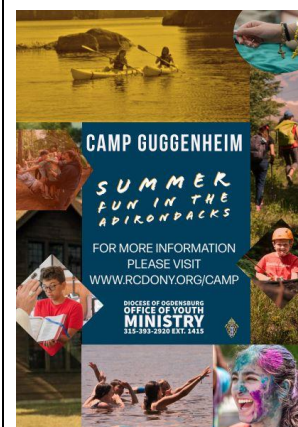

SAINT MARK (APRIL 25, 2021) The author of the earliest and shortest gospel, Mark was a member of the first Christian community in Jerusalem. Christians used his mother's house as a place of prayer during Peter's imprisonment under Herod Agrippa. When Paul and Barnabas returned from Jerusalem, they took Mark back with them to Antioch in Syria. Later, they brought him along as their assistant on a missionary journey. After this, Mark returned to Jerusalem. In Christian art Mark is often depicted with a winged lion. Legends speak of Mark as bishop of Alexandria, where he cured a shoemaker and was killed in the streets of the city. He is a patron of notaries of Egypt and Venice.
