THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In Today's gospel, Jesus invites people to repent and believe that the "kingdom of God has come near." Throughout his ministry, in both word and deed, Jesus showed humanity that the kingdom of God is a present reality. For Christians, the appropriate response to the presence of God is real time – in the here and now – is conversion and discipleship.

In the first reading, God Commands Jonah to action, he gets up and goes forth. Jonah's faithfulness to his prophetic task leads the people of Nineveh, from the grandest leaders to the smallest child, to repent and change their ways.

In the Gospel, Simon, Andrew, James and John have no way of knowing what the future holds for them as followers of Jesus. Yet, they respond without hesitation. They forsake the comfortable, familiar and certain. They place the nearness of the kingdom of God, manifest in Jesus, at the very center of their lives.

We are also called to be followers of Jesus and prophets of our time. We are effective messengers of the good news when ongoing spiritual renewal informs our conduct and lifestyle. May today's liturgy advance our conversion and fill us with the confidence to get up and go forth, praising God with our lives.

The Seven Joys and Sorrows of St. Joseph Seven are the Sundays from Jan. 31 to March 14, 2021The Seven Sundays of St. Joseph are observed by receiving Holy Communion in St. Joseph's honor on seven consecutive Sundays, each Sunday recalling one of his sorrows and one of his joys. This devotion may be practiced at any time of the year, but especially on the seven Sundays preceding the Solemnity of St. Joseph on March 19th.



PRAYER TO ST. JOSEPH: Joseph, you were a man who carried into dark of anxious sleep the haunting mystery of deep, unsettled doubt. But yet, within, and all untouched, your citadel of trust was calm, serene and still and flamed your unstarred night into the answering of dawn in God's unchanging will. SAINT FRANCIS DE SALES - JANUARY 24, 2021

A leader of the Catholic Reformation, Francis was born in France in 1567. His family insisted he study law rather than enter the seminary. After obtaining doctorates in both canon and civil law by the age of 24, Francis chose religious life instead. His family eventually became reconciled to his choice and he was ordained in 1593.

Appointed bishop of Geneva in 1602, Francis reorganized the diocese, reformed religious education, established a seminary and founded schools. He lived a life of austerity and simplicity, sharing with the poor. Wise and intelligent, he emphasized both the loving kindness of God and the human capacity for love.

Francis was beatified the year he died, 1622 – the first formal beatification to take place in St. Peter's – and canonized in 1665. He is the patron saint of writers and journalists and the deaf.
