FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT - LAETARE SUNDAY

A young gang member in a state prison told the priest who came to visit him about a dream he had in which the two were together in a completely dark room. However, the priest had a flashlight that he shone on the switch. He didn't go over to turn it on, but simply showed the youth where it was. The youth had to go and turn on the light himself. And his comment to the priest was, "The light is so much better than the darkness." The light of Christ is so much better than the darkness of selfishness and sin. But Christ cannot force that light upon us. As the Gospel tells us, we have to come to the light. We have to choose to allow the light of Christ to shine in and through us. Sometimes we need a little help to find it because we don't know where to look. But once we find the light of God's loving presence in our life and embrace it, life looks a whole lot better. May the light of Christ, lifted up for our salvation, shine brightly in us so that all we do may be done in God and be a witness to the power of God's love.

CHRISTIANITY IN THE PHILIPPINES: Christianity came to the Philippine Islands 500 years ago on March 16, 1321. In September 1319, Portuguese explorer Ferdinand Magellan sailed westward to the "new world" searching for a westward route to the Far East and the wealthy prospects of the Spice Islands (now Indonesia). As he neared the Spice Island, he became the first European to visit the Philippines, landing on the southern island of Cebu. Magellan introduced his Catholic faith to the people, and later presented the chief with a small figure of Santo Nino de Cebu, the country's oldest religious icon. The first Mass was celebrated on Limasawa Island on Easter Sunday, March 31, 1321. While under Spanish rule, the Philippines were evangelized by Dominicans, Augustinian and Franciscans. The Dominican established the University of Santo Tomas, which is Asia's oldest university. In 1987, Lorenzo Ruiz became the first Filipino saint. Today, about 81 percent of the country's 100 million people are Catholic, Asia's largest Catholic population.

FEAST OF ST JOSEPH: The feast of St Joseph commemorates Joseph, the husband of the virgin Mary and stepfather of Jesus. Joseph married Mary and later discovered that she was pregnant. Knowing that this child was not his own but not wanting any harm to come to her, he sent her away. Joseph only brought her back when an angel came to him in a dream explaining that the child Mary carried inside of her was conceived from the Holy Spirit. It is believed that Joseph died before Jesus began his public life as an adult as there is no mention of Joseph in the bible after Jesus' childhood. The feast of St. Joseph is celebrated annually on March 19th.

LAETARE SUNDAY is the Roman Catholicism's Fourth Sunday of Lent. Laetare is the first word — meaning "rejoice" — in the Latin text. On Laetare Sunday the Church expresses hope and joy in the midst of our Lenten fasts and penances. The change in color from purple to pink indicates a glimpse of the joy that awaits us at Easter, just before we enter into the somber days of Passiontide. During Lent, the General Instruction of the Roman Missal forbids flowers adorning the altar. But on Laetare Sunday there's a temporary half to these penitential observations! Laetare Sunday is the Church's way of giving us a "shot in the arm" as we approach the darkness and horror of the days through Good Friday and Holy Saturday. It's an opportunity to savor and keep in the back of our minds what awaits us on Easter Sunday — the reality that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead, and that our hearts will always be filled with joy!
