TRIBUTE TO SISTER MARY CHRISTINE On the First



Sunday of Easter, April 24, 1949, Sister Mary Christine Taylor knelt before the altar at the Motherhouse of the Sisters of St. Joseph (SSJ) in Watertown to be consecrated to God as a religious Sister of St. Joseph. The Most Reverend Bryan J. McEntegart, Fifth Bishop of Ogdensburg received her into the Congregation.

Sister Mary Christine for over 65 years has been one of Christ's instruments to spread His Love to thousands of souls in the Diocese of Ogdensburg. As academic dean of Mater Dei

College, Sister Mary Christine first met the Mohawks of Akwesasne. In October 1972, Sister Mary Christine and Sister Mary Louise Fiedler affirmed that the Sisters of St. Joseph (SSJ) would bring college courses to Akwesasne. Subsequently, from January 1973 until Mater Dei College closed in 1999, the St. Regis Mohawk Mater Dei Branch Campus educated hundreds. In addition, Sister Mary Christine was asked by Mohawk Elders to help initiate the St. Regis Mohawk Office of the Aging and Meals on Wheels Programs, today it is in a beautiful Senior's building. Another visit was made to ask Sister for aid in the creation of a program for persons suffering with addictions. Mater Dei College also enabled Akwesasronon to earn a college degree in their Alcohol and Chemical Dependence Program. Today, the Partridge House is still important in helping victims of addiction. There was a great need for a medical clinic in Akwesasne, and Sister assisted in obtaining grants for the first clinic that has since expanded to the St. Regis Mohawk Health Services program.

Over the years Sister Christine's blessed ministry included taking Jesus in Holy Communion weekly to two Akwesasronon Elders homes, IAKHIHSOHTHA and TSIIONKWAHNONHSO:TE. Sister Mary Christine wishes to extend her heartfelt thanks to all of the Akwesasronon whom she has been privileged to serve in the name of Jesus over 42 of her 65 years as an SSJ.
