### 13<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

As a parent, I can only imagine the utter panic that Jairus would have been feeling in today's Gospel. His beloved child is at death's door. Then just when there's a glimmer of hope that Jesus will save her, the news arrives: "Your daughter is dead." How devastated Jairus must have been at hearing those words!

But then Jesus speaks: "Do not fear, only believe." And amazingly, Jairus does! He doesn't know how this is going to end. What he does know, though, is that Jesus is with him through it. From the moment Jairus fell at his feet, Jesus has been walking with him...literally. And that belief, that trust, enables Jairus to continue on, even in the face of death.

Life is filled with difficult challenges; it's part of the human condition. And when we reach out to him, Jesus speaks these same words to each one of us. Life threatening illness? "Do not fear, only believe." Seemingly irreparably broken relationships? "Do not fear, only believe."

#### JUNE 29 - THE SOLEMNITY OF SAINTS PETER & PAUL

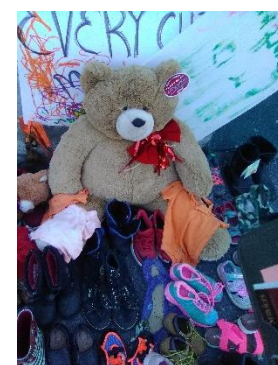
Veneration of the two great Apostles, Peter and Paul, has its roots in the very foundations of the Church. They are the solid rock on which the Church is built. They are at the origin of her faith and will forever remain her protectors and her guides. To them Rome owes her true

greatness, for it was under God's providential guidance that they were led to make the capital of the Empire, sanctified by their martyrdom, the center of the Christian world whence should radiate the preaching of the Gospel. St. Peter suffered martyrdom under Nero, in A.D. 66 or 67. He was buried on the hill of the Vatican where recent excavations have revealed his tomb on the very site of the Basilica of St. Peter's. St. Paul was beheaded in the Via Ostia on the spot where now stands the basilica bearing his name. Down the centuries Christian people in their thousands have gone on pilgrimage to the tombs of these Apostles. In the second and third centuries the Roman Church already stood pre-eminent by reason of her apostolicity, the infallible truth of her teaching and her two great figures, St. Peter and St. Paul.

**COLLECT PRAYER:** Grant, we pray, O Lord our God, that we may be sustained by the intercession of the blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, that, as through them you gave your Church the foundations of her heavenly office, so through them you may help her to eternal salvation. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

**DISCOVERY AT THE KAMLOOPS INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL ON THE TK'EMLÚPS TE SECWÉPEMC FIRST NATION:** The St. Regis Mission Church anticipates reopening the weekend of July 3-4, 2021. With the approval of the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne Emergency Operations Center it is our hope to reopen to our prior approved number of 50

parishioners per mass. In anticipation of the re-opening we plan to conduct a prayer service outside the church to respectfully move the flag and shoes placed by the community to the side yard of the Church by the large crucifix. The prayer service will follow with a Mass honoring the 215 innocent souls and victims. With you, we continue to be shocked by the discovery of 215 lost children and another 104 children in Manitoba. Our hearts break for these lost souls and all who were traumatized in this part of Church and Canadian history. More details and information will follow.
