17TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Christianity's deepest truth is that it is not a list of precepts but rather a relationship with the Triune God. To accept this invitation to participate in the divine life is to also elevate our human relationships. Through our one baptism and one faith we are united in the Mystical Body. In the Holy Eucharist, this union is intensified in the most efficacious and wonderous way.

Paul rouses us from our sleep to urge us to live a life worthy of the call we have been given. This call, which was slowly and lovingly revealed by God, is seen in today's readings. The call is to live a eucharistic life: a life that is not radically individualistic but radically ground up and poured out, in love, for God and neighbour. Receiving his body, blood, soul and divinity into our souls and bodies, we become living tabernacles. Our purpose is to bring Christ to others. As Elisha says, we are to give to the people to eat.

The Eucharist is the mystery of Christ's love, which is the most beautiful thing on earth. Nowhere is the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist clearer than in today's Gospel. All people hunger for God. We need to desire more than anything to forget ourselves and bring Jesus to the multitudes for the salvation of the world.



FEAST OF SAINT IGNATIUS OF

LOYOLA: St. Ignatius Loyola was born in 1491, one of 13 children of a family of minor nobility in northern Spain. As a young man Ignatius Loyola dreamed of doing great deeds. But in 1521 Ignatius was gravely wounded in a battle with the French. While recuperating, Ignatius

Loyola experienced a conversion. Reading the lives of Jesus and the saints aroused Ignatius desires to do great things. Ignatius realized that these feelings were clues to God's direction for him. Over the years, Ignatius became expert in the art of spiritual direction. With a small group of friends, Ignatius Loyola founded the Society of Jesus, or the JESUITS. Ignatius conceived the Jesuits as "contemplatives in action." These Jesuits.became great educators in the Catholic faith and missionaries to every corner of the world.

Here at the St. Regis Mission, it was the Jesuit Fathers who accompanied the Mohawks of Kahnawake who founded the St. Regis Mission in 1752. On this Feast of St. Ignatius, we remember the Jesuits who lovingly served our community over the years: Rev. P. Joseph Bourget (1895-1937), Rev. Conrad Hauser, S.J. (1937-1938), Rev. Michael Jacobs, S.J. (1938-1965), Rev. Francis Xavier Arsenault, S.J. (1965-1976), Rev. Gordon Bazinet, S.J. (1977-1979), Rev. Gerard LaVigne, S.J. (1979-1982), Rev. Thomas F. Eagan, S.J. (1982-1994). Rev. Thomas F. Fleig, S.J (1982-1992), Rev. George H. Belgard S.J (1995-2010) as well as, our beloved Jesuit Brothers, Brother Eustache Savard, SJ and Brother Bertrand Girard, SJ who assisted the St. Regis Mission for many years.
