32nd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Widows figure prominently in this Sunday's reading because of their vulnerability (they are most likely destitute)., their self-offering and their complete trust in God. The first lives outside the Israelite fold in a region where Baal is worshipped, the second is one of Israel's own. The first, by her faith, becomes an instrument helping to demonstrate the character, power and jurisdiction of the God of Israel. The second, by the same faith in God, models the appropriate behaviour for all sincere disciples: a constant dependence on, and love for, God.

By contrast, those who give only from their surplus, who serve themselves and their own interests, who take advantage of the vulnerable, show that they have not truly recognized who this God is. The source and sustainer of all creation, God is also redeemer of that creation. Salvation is offered and accomplished by the very self-offering of Jesus Christ, who gave of himself out of love, once and for all. Praise the Lord, O my soul!

None can compare to this Trinitarian Holy One who is our constant advocate, the source of our substance, the protector of the vulnerable and achiever of justice. Before this God, our self-interest is unworthy. It is entirely appropriate, then, that we pray in today's liturgy, out of gratitude and in need of mercy, for the grace of integrity.

"Which is the first of all of the commandments?" Jesus' answer is very clear... LOVE! This love has three facets.

LOVE OF GOD because of who God is — our origin and our destiny; God is the most supreme and most infinite goodness.

LOVE OF NEIGHBOR because our neighbor was created in the image and likeness of God and is a child of God. The sacred love we have for each other is the true image of our heavenly love for God.

LOVE OF SELF because when we are at our best, all of us are the "most holy and living images of the divine." Why is authentic love of self so critical to our love of God and neighbor? Simply, if we fail to love ourselves, how can we possibly give praise and thanks to God for creating us? How can we possibly love our neighbor who comes from the same source as we do — God Himself. HOW IS YOUR LOVE OF GOD? HOW IS YOUR LOVE OF NEIGHBOR? HOW IS YOUR LOVE OF SELF?
