30th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The readings today present a vision of praise and gratitude. Psalm 126 is one of the 15 psalms of ascent that were sung by Jews as they "ascended" the stairs of the Temple three times annually to celebrate their festivals. Verse five notes, "May those who sow in tears reap what shouts of joy." And it is with heartfelt cries of joy that we are able to acknowledge Jesus the Christ as high Priest and Saviour in the Letter to the Hebrews. An example of Jesus' compassionate dealings with sinners and those who suffer is seen in today's Gospel. His interaction with Bartimaeus, the blind beggar, reflects Jesus' love for the forgotten members of his body. The beggar refuses to be silenced, so great is his distress. His faith surpasses all humiliation or fear of rejection. "What do you want me to do for you?" "Let me see again." What does the beggar want to see? What do we want to see again? What would we answer to Jesus' simple question. "What do you want me to do for you?" It is a daunting thought that the Son of God would ask us this question. What will your answer be? Today, on World Mission Sunday, let us renew our commitment to spreading the Good News in our towns, cities, country and beyond.

ALL SAINTS DAY AND ALL SOULS DAY

In the Catholic Church, "the faithful" refers specifically to baptized Catholics; "all souls" commemorates the church penitent of souls in purgatory, whereas "all saints" commemorates the church triumphant of saints in Heaven. The Christian celebration of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day stems from a belief that there is a powerful spiritual bond between those in heaven (the "Church triumphant"), and the living (the

"Church militant").

NOVEMBER 1ST ALL SAINTS DAY - Every year on November 1st, many Roman Catholics and other Christians around the world observe All Saints Day, which honors all saints of the church deemed to have attained heaven. Mass is offered to praise and thank God for these holv ones.

NOVEMBER 2, 2021- ALL SOULS DAY is



a centuries old tradition in Western Christianity to observe All Souls' Day on November 2nd by attending mass, offering prayers and sacrifices, and lighting candles to help ease the suffering of those who have

died without having been saved and whose souls are believed to be in purgatory. Through prayer, penance, and almsgiving, we beg God to take the souls of our loved ones in Purgatory to Heaven.

SYNOD 2021-2023: Pope Francis has opened a three-year synodal journey of consultations and discernment, which will culminate with an assembly in October 2023 in Rome. The process includes three phases: Diocesan, Continental and Universal. The local synodal progress began Sunday October 17, 2021 at the St. Mary's Cathedral in Ogdensburg.. An introductory meeting followed after Mass with delegates from throughout the Diocese. The agenda covered a definition of synod, a Synodal Church, Synod objectives and the Diocesan timeline. Phase 1 is November thru Advent, Phase 2 January, Phase 3 February, Phase 4 March and Phase 5 Synthesis. Regional meetings with Delegates and Pastors will be held on November 3-5 in Clayton, Colton and Morrisonville respectively.
