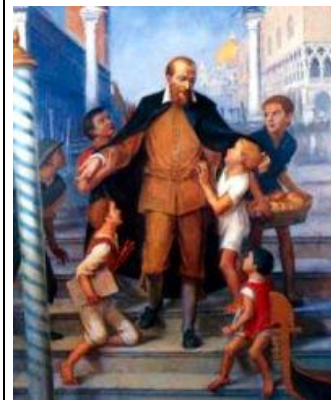

FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Just for a moment, put yourself into today's Gospel. Imagine the cries of the seagulls overhead, the noise of the crowd gathered to hear Jesus, the pungent smell of dirty nets, the salty language of cranky fishermen who have worked all night and caught nothing.

In the Incarnation, God loves us so passionately that he enters fully into the messiness of our human lives, stinky fishing nets and all. And, just as for Peter, it is often in the very midst of our ordinary, everyday lives that Jesus comes to us and calls us to bring his message of God's love into our world. Our listening ear to a distraught co-worker, even when we are behind on a project. Reflects a God who cares deeply for us. Getting up in the middle of the night to comfort a frightened child speaks to a God who is always present to us. Heard with the ears of faith, the most mundane moments of our daily lives can be a call to follow Christ's way of self-giving love.

When we celebrate the Eucharist, we profess our belief that God comes to us most profoundly through the ordinary things of life. Simple bread and wine become Christ's Body and Blood. Nourished and transformed by his real presence, may we who celebrate this mystery today become the gift of God's presence to our world.



SAINT JEROME EMILIANI – FEAST DAY – FEBRUARY 8, 2022

St Jerome Emiliani, Priest, is the Patron Saint of Orphans and abandoned children. Saint Jerome Emiliani was a member of one of the patrician families of Venice, and, like many other Saints, in early life a soldier. He was appointed governor of a fortress among the mountains of Treviso, and whilst bravely defending his post, was made prisoner by the enemy. In the misery

of his dungeon he invoked the great Mother of God, and promised, if she would set him free, to lead a new and a better life. Our Lady appeared, broke his fetters, and led him forth through the midst of his enemies. At Treviso he hung up his chains at her altar, dedicated himself to her service, and on reaching his home at Venice devoted himself to a life of active charity. His special love was for the deserted orphan children whom, in the times of the plague and famine, he found wandering in the streets. He took them home, clothed and fed them, and taught them the Christian truths. He founded orphanages through Northern Italy. St. Jerome died February 8, 1537, of an illness which he had caught in visiting the sick.

ST JEROME EMILIANI QUOTE: *Let us learn from St. Jerome to exert ourselves in behalf of the many hundred children whose souls are perishing around us for want of some one to show them the way to heaven.*

Born in 480 of wealthy parents, Scholastica and Benedict were brought up together until he left central Italy for Rome to continue his studies. Scholastica founded a religious community for women near Monte Cassino at Plombariola, five miles from where her brother governed a monastery. She is the patron of nuns – especially Benedictines – and children with convulsive disorders. Scholastica and Benedict gave themselves totally to God and gave top priority to deepening their friendship with him through prayer.



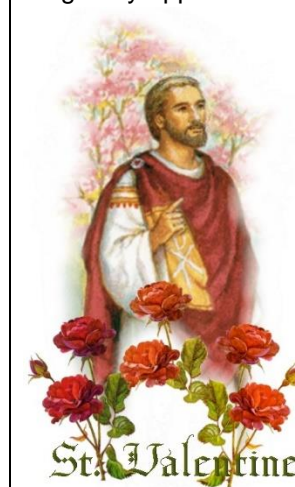
WORLD DAY FOR CONSECRATED LIFE

THE STORY OF ST. VALENTINE Saint Valentine is the patron saint of love. Believers say God worked through his life to perform miracles and teach people how to recognize and experience true love. This famous saint, an Italian doctor who later became a priest, inspired the creation of the holiday of Valentine's Day. He was sent to jail for performing weddings for couples during a time when new marriages

were outlawed in the ancient Rome. Before he was killed for refusing to renounce his faith, he sent a loving note to a child he had been helping to teach, the daughter of his jailer, and that note eventually led to the tradition of sending Valentine's cards.
