THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY JAN 18-25

After a busy Christmas season, I was helping to settle into Ordinary time with comforting words from Scripture. Today's texts do not comfort me. In the Gospel, Jesus returns to a familiar verse from the prophet Isaiah but does not simply quote it. He lays out the next steps for our path, fulfilling the command in our hearing. I recognize his invitation in my life. I am to go to the poor, the captive, the blind and to be good news, release and sight. As I pray this text, I recognize my poverty, captivity and blindness. The subtitle in my Bible for Today's Gospel is "the Rejection of Jesus of Nazareth" (as we will see next Sunday). The path is not easy. Our friends and families may turn from us, as they did from Jesus. On this Sunday of the Word of God, promulgated by Pope Francis in September 2019, we turn to the Word as people who can "hear with understanding." In the first reading, Ezra does not stand alone; and in the second reading, Paul reminds us the body is not one member. These are timely texts as we observe the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. May we know the power of the Spirit as we go about this mission, together. (livingwithchrist.ca)

THE THEME FOR THE WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY IN 2022

was selected by the Middle East Council of Churches. Present times are extremely difficult and economically disastrous. All this combined with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have made the situation quite stressful. The power of prayer in solidarity with those who suffer is a demonstration of Christian unity and a sign of communion. The theme, taken from the second chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew, is the Epiphany. Each year in January, the Church recalls the visit of the Magi to Bethlehem, highlighting God's invitation to all of humanity to a new covenant in the Incarnation of Christ. In the Eastern Churches, Epiphany is joined to the mystery of the Baptism of Christ, a baptism all Christians hold in common as testimony to their faith in the Son of God. (USCCB)

Day 1, Raise us up and draw us to your perfect light: "We observed his star in the East." (Matthew 2:2)

Day 2, Humble leadership breaks down walls and builds up with love: "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews?" (Matthew 2:2)

Day 3, The presence of Christ, turning the world upside down: "When King Herod heard this he was disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him." (Matthew 2:3)

Day 4, Though small and suffering, we lack nothing: "And you, Bethlehem... are by no means least" (Matthew 2:6)

Day 5, Guided by the One Lord: "Ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising." (Matthew 2:9)

Day 6, Gathered in worship around the One Lord: "They saw the child with Mary his mother, and they knelt down and paid him homage." (Matthew 2:11)

Day 7, The gifts of communion: "Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh." (Matthew 2:11)

Day 8, Beyond the familiar routes of separation to God's new paths: "They left for their own country by another road." (Matthew 2:12)

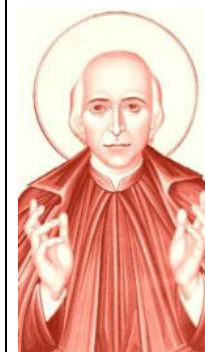

ST. VINCENT PALLOTTI, FEAST - JANUARY 22, 2022

Born in Rome in 1795, St. Vincent became a priest and dedicated himself completely to God and cared for souls. He dreamed of gaining for Christ all non-Catholics. To this end he inaugurated a revolutionary program which envisaged the collaboration of the laity in the apostolate of the

clergy. But St. Vincent was also well aware of the many deprivations in the natural sphere that hindered the spread of the Faith. He thus obtained and spent huge sums for the poor and underprivileged. He founded guilds for workers, agriculture schools, loan associations, orphanages and homes for girls - all of which made him the pioneer and precursor of Catholic Action. His great legacy was the congregation which he founded for urban mission work, known as the "Society for Catholic Action".
