SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

God's love for us is unlimited. Easter is the ultimate demonstration of that. So why do we sometimes limit what we can receive from God?

In Grade 8, my favorite sport was basketball and I was happily surprised to make the school team. I didn't enjoy the experience, though, because I felt I didn't know what I was doing and would be found out at any moment. Similarly, in today's Gospel, Thomas closed himself off to God's gifts.

When Jesus appeared to the disciples, they were afraid and uncertain. He brought them the comfort and sense of purpose they needed. Thomas was not present for this encounter, but he too was probably afraid and longed for reassurance. He had seen Jesus perform miracles and knew that Jesus was capable of rising from the dead. The disciples' words could have been enough for Thomas to receive the peace and purpose that Jesus wanted to give him. Instead, he chose to remain in fear and doubt for a whole week longer than everyone else.

Jesus didn't give up on Thomas. He came back just for him. This time. Thomas responded eagerly and open-heartedly. Let us have an easter and open faith and guard against fear and doubt so that we can enjoy the limitless gifts God has for us. (livingwithchrist.ca)



FEAST OF ST. KATERI TEKAKWITHA (APRIL 17) The first North American Indigenous woman to be canonized, Kateri is often called the Lily of the Mohawks.

Kateri was born in 1656 on the southern bank of the Mohawk River at Osserleon (Auriesville, NY). Her mother was a Christian Algonquin from Trois-Rivieres, Quebec and her father was a non-Christian Mohawk Chief. When she was four years old, a smallpox epidemic killed her parents and her brother, and left her with seriously impaired eyesight and a disfigured face.

Inspired by Jesuit missionaries from an early age, Tekakwitha was baptized on Easter Sunday 1676 and assumed the name Kateri, likely in honour of St. Catherine of Siena. The following year, due to persecution in her community, Kateri escaped to Kahnawake on the St. Lawrence River opposite Tiohtiaki (Montreal). She had a strong devotion to the Eucharist and a deep concern for others. She died on April 17, 1680. St. Kateri Tekakwitha was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on Oct. 21, 2012. She is the patroness of ecology and the environment, people in exile and Native Americans.

PRAYER FOR UKRAINE:


