18th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Today's readings warn us about greed. Greed is a consequence of original sin. It is one of the seven deadly sins and, for some, perhaps the deadliest. As Paul teaches us, greed is a form of idolatry, replacing God with money or other earthly possessions. The greedy seek happiness in these possessions. Even the poor can be greedy if they believe they would be happier if they simply had more.

In reality, greed leads to terrible loneliness, emptiness and misery. The greedy are never satisfied, as they place their hope in a false god. Money or possessions can never satisfy us, as they will never be enough. The truth is we are made for so much more. God is our father, and we are his children. In God alone will we find meaning and purpose for our lives. In him alone will our hearts find rest. In him alone will we find fulfillment and happiness.

Let today's reading be a reminder to keep our priorities straight. God understands that we need certain possessions for our lives on earth. However, let us not set our hearts on these things or make them our priority. Put God first, and we will be amazed at how he takes care of all the little things. Ask him for a grateful and generous heart, and he will not disappoint.



FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION. AUGUST 6, 2022: The feast

commemorates one of the pinnacles of Jesus' earthly life, when he revealed his divinity to three of his closest disciples by means of a miraculous and supernatural light. Before his triumphal entry into Jerusalem, Christ climbed to a high point on Mount Tabor with his disciples Peter, James, and John. While Jesus prayed upon the mountain, his appearance was changed by a brilliant white light which

shone from him and from his clothing. Matthew, Mark, and Luke all record that the voice of God was heard, confirming Jesus as his son. In his address before the Angelus on August 6, 2006, Pope Benedict XVI described how the events of the transfiguration display Christ as the "full manifestation of God's light." The Pope stressed that the feast of the Transfiguration is an important opportunity for believers to look to Christ as "the light of the world," and to experience the kind of conversion which the Bible frequently describes as an emergence from darkness to light. "In our time too," Pope Benedict said, "we urgently need to emerge from the darkness of evil, to experience the joy of the children of light!"

of the dedication of Santa Maria Maggiore in Rome, both in its rebuilding in the 5th century and the original construction during the reign of Pope Liberius century prior. It was added to the liturgical feast calendar by Pope Pius V in the late 16th century.

Though the miraculous event was never substantiated, the legend has it that a wealthy 4th-century Roman couple, seeking to donate all their earthly wealth to the church, asked the Virgin Mary for guidance. Soon after, on the evening of 5 August, in the peak of summer's sweltering heat, a snowfall was reported to have occurred. The couple took this as a sign that they should contribute to the expense of building a new basilica on the site of the miraculous snow, resulting in the original construction of Santa Maria Maggiore.



APOLOGY OF POPE FRANCIS:

In an address in Maskwacis, Alberta July 25, 2022, the Pope gave a formal apology for the church's role in Canada's residential school systems. "I have been waiting to come here and be with you! ... I have come to your

native lands to tell you in person of my sorrow, to implore God's forgiveness, healing and reconciliation, to express my closeness and to pray with you and for you."

"Today I am here, in this land that, along with its ancient memories, preserves the scars of still open wounds. I am here because the first step of my penitential pilgrimage among you is that of again asking forgiveness, of telling you once more that I am deeply sorry. Sorry for the ways in which, regrettably, many Christians supported the colonizing mentality of the powers that oppressed the Indigenous peoples. I am sorry. ask forgiveness, in particular, for the ways in which many members of the Church and of religious communities cooperated, not least through their indifference, in projects of cultural destruction and forced assimilation promoted by the governments of that time, which culminated in the system of residential schools".

"Our own efforts are not enough to achieve healing and reconciliation: we need God's grace. We need the guiet and powerful wisdom of the Spirit, the tender love of the Comforter. May he bring to fulfilment the deepest expectations of our hearts. May he guide our steps and enable us to advance together on our journey."
