21st SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The prophet Isiah shares with us a vision of people of "all nations and tongues" coming to the Lord. Jesus also speaks of people coming from the "east and west, from north and south," to feast in God's kingdom. Paradoxically, though, Jesus first speaks about "the narrow door." How can the way to God be both narrow and wide?

Perhaps it is narrow in the sense that we cannon merit it through some special status, like race, religion, or class. We cannot earn it by performing correct rituals, saying the right prayers, following the rules. If we rely on our own merit or status, the way to God seems impossibly narrow.

We don't merit or earn God's love, mercy and grace: they are freely given. Our call is to receive and respond. Luke's Gospel shows us many unlikely people who are God's chosen. God's beloved: the young Mary, her cousin Elizabeth, the shepherds, fishermen, the woman who anointed Jesus' feet, the Samaritan leper. Zaccheus the tax collector. God's love is widely available. and those who know they have received this gift want to live it and share it with others.

This is our call as disciples: this is what we celebrate in the Eucharist. As God's beloved, we trust that salvation is in loving God and one another.



FEASTS OF ST. MONICA AND ST. AUGUSTINE, AUGUST 27 AND 28, 2022 We hear from many parents who continually pray for their children to return to

the Catholic Church. There are few people who understand these parents' hearts and struggles

better than St. Monica.

St. Monica prayed unceasingly, fasted and wept for the conversion of her son, Augustine, back to the Catholic Faith from his wayward lifestyle. "I do not know what there is left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled. All I wished for was that I might see you a Catholic and a child of Heaven. God Granted me even more than this in making you despise earthly felicity and consecrate yourself to His service." St. Monica to St. Augustine.

"The memory of those children is indeed painful; it urges us to work to ensure that every child is treated with love, honour and respect. At the same time, those moccasins also speak to us of a path to follow, a journey that we desire to make together. We want to walk together, to pray together and to work together, so that the sufferings of the past can lead to a future of justice, healing and reconciliation."

It is painful to think of how the firm soil of values. language and culture that made up the authentic identity of your peoples was eroded, and that you have continued to pay the price of this.

"I am sorry. I ask forgiveness, in particular, for the ways in which many members of the church and of religious communities co-operated, not least through their indifference, in projects of cultural destruction and forced assimilation promoted by the governments of that time, which culminated in the system of residential schools."

"In the face of evil, we pray to the Lord of goodness; in the face of death, we pray to the God of life. Our Lord Jesus Christ took a grave, which seemed the burial place of every hope and dream, leaving behind only sorrow, pain and resignation, and made it a place of rebirth and resurrection, the beginning of a history of new life and universal reconciliation."

"Our own efforts are not enough to achieve healing and reconciliation: we need God's grace. We need the quiet and powerful wisdom of the Spirit, the tender love of the Comforter. May He bring to fulfilment the deepest expectations of our hearts. May He guide our steps and enable us to advance together on our journey."
