24TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Humankind is a suffering and broken global family. Today calls to mind 9/11 and its enduring legacy of lost lives, lost dear ones, lost hopes. Recent years have highlighted the mounting urgency of climate change, as well as the phenomenon of vast hordes of migrants fleeing war, oppression or starvation in their homelands. Early 2020 brought the fear and disruption of a global pandemic, and the resulting economic and social upheaval starkly exposed long-standing systemic issues of racism and injustice.

The family in today's Gospel story has also experienced suffering and brokenness: the loss of one child, the resentment of another, the broken hearts of the father and – though she is unmentioned – most certainly the mother too.

How to deal with all this pain? The parable points toward some answers. The father, his eyes on the distant horizon, had clearly never given up hope that his son would one day return. Humble and contrite, the boy is welcomed home with open-hearted compassion and forgiveness. The older son's resentment is met not with impatience or anger, but with a response that is calm, reasonable and loving.

There are no simple answers to the complex problems facing our families and our world. But there are ways that we can begin: with humble heart, a forgiving spirit, compassion, and generosity and, above all, hope. (September: Living with Christ)

CURSILLO WEEKENDS FOR MEN AND WOMEN: Apply Now.

Men's Weekend: October 27-30 and Women's Weekend: Nov. 17-20:

A Cursillo Weekend is an encounter with self, Christ, and others. It is three days of joyful living and sharing, experiencing and learning a simple method to know God better and develop more fully as a Christian. The purpose of the weekend is to provide the tools for daily Christian living. Cursillo begins on a Thursday evening and ends Sunday evening.

During the three days, participants hear talks given by priests, deacons and lay persons, and may participate in discussion with others in small groups. The Eucharist is celebrated each day, and there is time for personal prayer and reflection, Sacrament of Reconciliation and fellowship. The weekend reviews the basics of Catholic faith with an emphasis on how you may live it more effectively in your own life.

Since each person's circumstances in life are different and each has a unique relationship with God, the Cursillo weekend is a deeply personal experience and, as such, can't be fully described. APOSTOLIC JOURNEY OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS to CANADA

(24 - 30 JULY 2022)
The great challenges of our day, like peace, climate change, the

effects of the pandemic and international migration movements, all have one thing in common: they are global challenges; they regard everyone. And since all of them speak of the need to consider the whole, politics cannot remain imprisoned in partisan interests. We need to be able to look, as the indigenous wisdom tradition teaches, seven generations ahead, and not to our immediate convenience, to the next elections, or the support of this or that lobby. But we need also to appreciate the yearning of young people for fraternity, justice and peace. In order to preserve memory and wisdom, we need to listen to the elderly, but in order to press forward towards the future, we also need to embrace the dreams of young people. They deserve a better future than the one we are preparing for them; they deserve to be involved in decisions about the building of the world of today and tomorrow, and particularly about the protection of our common home; in this regard, the values and teachings of the indigenous peoples are precious. Here I would like to express appreciation for the praiseworthy commitment being made on the local level to protecting the environment.

The Holy See and the local Catholic communities are concretely committed to promoting the indigenous cultures through specific and appropriate forms of spiritual accompaniment that include attention to their cultural traditions, customs, languages and educational processes, in the spirit of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. It is our desire to renew the relationship between the Church and the indigenous peoples of Canada, a relationship marked both by a love that has borne outstanding fruit and, tragically, deep wounds that we are committed to understanding and healing.

What we need are creative and farsighted policies capable of moving beyond the categories of opposition in order to provide answers to global challenges.

It is by working in common accord, hand in hand, that today's pressing challenges must be faced. I thank you for your hospitality, attention and respect, and with great affection I assure you that Canada and its people are truly close to my heart. *Pope Francis July 2022*
