25TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

How much of what we do each day in ordinary life demonstrates our ability to plan ahead? I should iron my shirt for the morning, make a start on that assignment, figure out how long it will take me to cycle to work, make a grocery list, set aside something for retirement. Just as the dishonest steward of today's Gospel, we are often successful thinking on our feet and getting into jams.

Can we be as resourceful and clear-headed with the practice of our Christian faith? Jesus' kingdom teaching demands decisive action. Given that it is possible to serve only one master with utter devotion, in what or whom will we place our trust? The Christian is meant to choose God above all else, loving God alone with unswerving devotion. Once such a choice is made, it is revealed even in the smallest actions, a consistent ethic of life.

We can take from today's readings some ideas about plans for action: give freely to others, rather than enslaving or destroying them; demonstrate a sincere and active concern for the salvation of all, even those who can harm us; be ready to sacrifice ourselves for others for the sake of the kingdom. Why? Because this is what God is like, revealed to us in Jesus the Christ. Blessed be the name of the Lord! (*Living with Christ: September*).



NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION SEPT. 30, 2022

Each year, September 30 marks the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. The day honours the children who never returned home and Survivors of residential schools, as well as their families and communities. Public commemoration of the

tragic and painful history and ongoing impacts of residential schools is a vital component of the reconciliation process. This federal statutory holiday was created through legislative amendments made by Parliament. Both the *National Day for Truth and Reconciliation* and *Orange Shirt Day* take place on September 30. Orange Shirt Day is an Indigenous-led grassroots commemorative day intended to raise awareness of the individual, family and community intergenerational impacts of residential schools, and to promote the concept of "Every Child Matters". The orange shirt is a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom and self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations.

Among the various visual elements illustrating Indigenous cultures, the circle is at the centre, which represents being together in spirit of reconciliation. The orange colour represents truth-telling and healing. The pathway represents the road to reconciliation. First Nations, Inuit and Métis are represented in the image. The eagle represents First Nations, the narwhal represents the Inuit and the beaded flower represents the Métis.

ON SEPTEMBER 29, 2022, we will be co-hosting our second

Akwesasne Multidenominational Prayer Service to promote unity and healing to honour the thousands of Survivors of residential schools across the country, as well as in Akwesasne. THE EVENT WILL TAKE PLACE FROM 1:00 TO 2:00PM AT THE GENERATIONS PARK PAVILION IN HOGANSBURG. Everyone is welcome. We will have unity speakers, prayers, smudging and drumming. The event is a collaboration of the Ecumenical Pastors Circle: the Mohawk Assembly of God, the Hogansburg United Methodist Church, the New Life Christian Church, the Church of Christ and the St. Regis Mission Church. Additional contributors are the Archdiocese of Ottawa – Cornwall and the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne.

I recall the meetings we had in Rome four months

ago. At that time, I was given two pairs of moccasins as a sign of the suffering endured by Indigenous children, particularly those who, unfortunately, never came back from the residential schools. I was asked to return the moccasins when I came to Canada, and I will do so at the end of these few words, in which I would like to reflect on this symbol, which over the past few months has kept alive my sense of sorrow, indignation and shame.

We want to walk together, to pray together and to work together, so that the sufferings of the past can lead to a future of justice, healing and reconciliation.- Pope Francis

The memory of those children is indeed painful; it urges us to work to ensure that every child is treated with love, honour and respect. At the same time, those moccasins also speak to us of a path to follow, a journey that we desire to make together. We want to walk together, to pray together and to work together, so that the sufferings of the past can lead to a future of justice, healing and reconciliation.

You have lived on these lands for thousands of years, following ways of life that respect the Earth, which you received as a legacy from past generations and are keeping for those yet to come. You have treated it as a gift of the Creator to be shared with others and to be cherished in harmony with all that exists, in profound fellowship with all living beings.

In this way, you learned to foster a sense of family and community, and to build solid bonds between generations, honouring your elders and caring for your little ones. A treasury of sound customs and teachings, centred on concern for others, truthfulness, courage and respect, humility, honesty and practical wisdom.

The words that I speak throughout this penitential journey are meant for every Native community and person. I embrace all of you with affection. (Pope Francis 2022)
