FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"Blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the lord."

Mary is expecting someone else's child? As Joseph wrestles with this difficult fact and its many challenges, God reaches out to reassure him. Joseph doesn't know what will happen next, why this is happening, or how he can possibly be the right man for this job, but Joseph knows the who – he knows God – and that's enough. If Joseph had a motto, it would likely be Psalm 37.3: "Trust in the Lord, and do good." It's how he lives his life. Time after time, Joseph trusts God and takes action. That faith gives him the courage to do the next right thing. It helps him take that next step. And the one after it.

Like joseph, we can trust God even if we don't fully understand our circumstances. Especially then. Like joseph, we can be en-couraged to do that next right thing just because God asked.

What is God asking of you? What plans might he be asking you to rethink? What challenge might he be asking you to face? Who is he entrusting to your care? If you are feeling anxious, confused or unprepared, remember: God is with you. THE "O ANTIPHONS" OF ADVENT The

Roman Church has been singing the "O" Antiphons since at least the eighth century. They are the antiphons that accompany the Magnificat canticle of Evening Prayer from December 17-23, the last seven days of Advent. They are a magnificent theology that uses ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic

hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah.

DECEMBER 17: O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!

DECEMBER 18: O Leader of the House of Israel, giver of the Law to Moses on Sinai: come to rescue us with your mighty power!

DECEMBER 19: O Root of Jesse's stem, sign of God's love for all his people: come to save us without delay!

DECEMBER 20: O Key of David, opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness! **DECEMBER 21:** O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

DECEMBER 22: O King of all nations and keystone of the Church: come and save man, whom you formed from the dust! **DECEMBER 23:** O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law: come to save us. Lord our God!

ADVENT WREATH PRAYER FOR THE FOURTH WEEK OF

ADVENT During the Advent season families should spend time together preparing for the approaching celebration of the birth of Christ. An Advent wreath can be a great focal point for family prayers and holiday celebrations. Children love the beauty of the simple traditional ceremony. Lighting candles in an Advent Wreath is a simple way to start a tradition of family worship in the home. Those who participate will cherish the experience all their lives. Each day your family should gather around the Advent wreath, generally before the evening meal. The proper number of candles are then lighted and a prayer is said.



Fourth Sunday of Advent

On the FOURTH WEEK The prayer that follows is to be repeated each day of the fourth week. After the prayer, all four candles are lit. O Lord, stir up Thy power, we pray Thee, and come; and with great might help us, that with the help of Thy Grace, Thy merciful forgiveness may hasten what our sins impede. Through Christ our

Lord. Amen. The four candles are allowed to burn during the evening meals of the fourth week. After the fourth week, the penitential season of Advent is over and the time to rejoice is at hand. The Advent wreath is transformed into a Christmas wreath. Ribbon and candles are replaced with red ribbon and long red or white tapers (to be lighted at breakfast on Christmas morning) and, if desired, other festive decorations can be added.

So may we, too, remember with thankful hearts the love that comes with each present we open.
